

Friday night, under the oak trees of Louise S. McGehee School, Teena Anderson of Teche Street in Algiers graduated, her mother, Faye, beaming as she watched.
That's not unusual — the school has been graduating students since 1912 and mothers have been beaming even longer. But Teena is the first black graduate.
"It's an honor," Teena said. She said that as graduation time
